

Q1 2024 RLB CRANE INDEX® HIGHLIGHTS

- With 869 cranes on sites nationally, the Q1 2024 RLB Crane Index® has recorded the second highest count in the 24 editions of the index.
- Both the residential crane index and the non-residential index were just below their highest level recorded.
- The highest number of cranes on a site in Australia was the Amazon Fulfillment Centre in Melbourne with seven cranes.
- The Gold Coast maintained its record number of cranes.
- New South Wales accounted for 49.5% of all cranes across Australia; Melbourne accounted for 22.3%; and South-East Queensland for 17.8% of all cranes.
- With a 196 crane difference, the gap between Sydney and Melbourne crane numbers continues to be significant.

AUSTRALIA

The RLB Crane Index® fell by three index points to reach 204 points in Q1 2024. The index value of 204 points is equivalent to 869 cranes across the country, down slightly from the record high of 882 reached in our last publication. Despite this slight dip, it is clear that crane numbers across the country remain high.

In the last six months, 367 new cranes were added to new projects, and 380 cranes were removed from buildings nearing completion. With 13 less cranes dotting the skyline, the number of cranes across the major cities is now the second highest recorded.

The large number of cranes observed correlates with national construction activity. According to the Australian Bureau of Statistics, total construction activity across Australia for the 2023 calendar year was up by 9.0%, or \$21bn, compared to 2022.


The residential index fell from the record high of 178 in the last edition by four index points to 174 points. The index represents 540 cranes, down from 553 in the last count. 210 cranes were added to residential projects, with 223 removed from sites.

The non-residential index remained steady at 286 points. There are 329 cranes on non-residential sites—the same total as in Q3 2023. The non-residential proportion of cranes across the country is 38%, up slightly from the 37% recorded in the last count.

Four cities recorded higher crane numbers for Q1 2024. Melbourne was the only city that gained more than 10 cranes.

When comparing current and historical crane numbers for Melbourne, Sydney and nationally, Melbourne bounced back after falling for the two previous counts. Melbourne's count of 194 cranes has climbed above the average of 175 since Q1 2015. Current crane numbers in Sydney and nationally are well above their respective averages of 310 and 708.



- The "X" indicates the average number of cranes counted over the past 24 editions of the crane index.


AUSTRALIA NET CRANE MOVEMENT BY CITY

NUMBER OF CRANES REMOVED / ADDED






The RLB Crane Index® eased slightly in Q1 2024 from the previous peak of 207, and currently sits at 204 points. There are currently 869 cranes across the county, down by 1.4% from Q3 2023.




The residential index dipped very slightly from 178 index point to 174 index points. There are currently 540 cranes on residential projects across the country.

The non-residential index remained stable on 286 points. The index persisted at an historically high level, indicating the overall strong activity of non-residential projects across the country.









ADELAIDE

The number of cranes operating in Adelaide remained steady since the last count. A total of eight cranes were removed, and eight cranes were erected on new projects commencing construction.



BRISBANE

Brisbane recorded a fall in the RLB Crane Index® value. The index dropped from 116 points, recorded in Q3 2023, to 107 points. The index represents a total of 78 cranes across Brisbane. 28 cranes were removed from sites and 21 new cranes were added in the past six months.

The total number of cranes across South-East Queensland has fallen from 168 to 155. This drop is primarily due to the removal of nine residential cranes across the region.

Total construction work done in Queensland increased by 11.3% in the 2023 calendar year compared to 2022. Engineering activity was up 16.7% or \$3.5bn, nonresidential was up 0.4% or \$0.4bn, and residential was up 10.5% or \$1.5bn.

Within the residential sector, apartment work done grew by 27.0% compared to the previous year and was 15.8% above the long-term average.

Queen's Wharf project—previously the largest project in terms of crane numbers in the region—saw four cranes removed, leaving only three cranes erected on site.

The residential sector continued to be the largest in Brisbane, accounting for 44% of all cranes (34 of 78 cranes). This is significantly lower than in both Melbourne and Sydney, where residential cranes account for 55% and 64% of all cranes in each city, respectively. Across South-East Queensland, residential cranes account for 67% of all cranes.










RLB CRANE INDEX® - CENTRAL COAST




DECREAS IN NUMBI OF CRAN

MELBOURNE

Melbourne recorded a 9% jump in crane numbers for this edition. The RLB Crane Index® rose to 167 points from 153 points in Q3 2023. Across Melbourne, 107 new cranes were added to projects, and 91 cranes were removed. This represents a net gain of 16 cranes, bringing the total number of cranes up to 194, compared to 178 recorded in the previous edition. This is a 13% drop in cranes compared to Q1 2019, when 222 cranes were recorded in Melbourne – the highest number of cranes since the RLB Crane Index® began.

Total construction work done for the 2023 calendar year was up 3.9% compared to 2022. Victoria's non-residential sector increased by 8.6% to \$17.6bn worth of work done in 2023 compared to 2022. Engineering work done increased by 11.4% to \$23.6bn in 2023, up from \$21.2bn in 2022.

The residential sector decreased by 4.9% compared to previous year. Most residential sub-sectors saw lower activity in 2023, with apartments down by 10.8% and new houses down slightly by 0.4%

Overall, Melbourne saw net crane increases in the civil sector (up nine), data centres (up four), mixed use (up five), residential (up 13) and retail (up one). This reflects the continued public works activity that has been fuelling the engineering sector for the past few years. Some of these projects include the Westgate Tunnel, North East Link, Level Crossing Removals, and the Metro Tunnel project, all of which are all contributing to a record number of civil cranes. The current number of 32 civil cranes is above the previous sector high of 23 cranes in Q3 2021.

A decline in net crane numbers was seen in commercial (down six), health (down four), education (down three), aged care (down one), hotel (down one) and recreation (down one).

PERTH

Perth's RLB Crane Index® fell from 116 to 105 index points. The index represents a total of 45 cranes across the city, slightly down from the 50 cranes reported previously. A total of 17 cranes was added to developments, offset by 22 removals.

Western Australia's residential sector saw a 9.0% increase in the preliminary value of work done in the 2023 calendar year, compared to the previous year. The apartment sector increased by 15.0%, while houses grew by 8.8%. The non-residential sector grew to \$5.4bn worth of work done, an increase of 12.2% over the \$4.8bn recorded in 2022. Preliminary engineering activity rose by 17.6% for the year. Overall, preliminary activity rose by 15.0% (or \$4.8bn) for the calendar year.












RLB CRANE INDEX® - SUNSHINE COAST

Sydney's RLB Crane Index® dipped by 3% from its peak level in the previous edition (248 index points) to 241 index points. The index now represents 390 cranes across Sydney. Over the past six months, a total of 172 cranes were removed, while 161 new cranes were erected. The non-residential sector saw a minor decrease of four cranes, on the high number of 143 cranes in Q3 2023. There are currently 139 cranes on non-residential projects across the region.

Preliminary construction activity for the 2023 calendar year in New South Wales rose by 11.9% or \$8.2bn, compared to the previous year. The residential sector saw an increase of 3.2% for the year. The non-residential sector grew by 5.3%. The engineering sector was the major contributor to the increase in total construction work done with \$34.8bn worth of work done in 2023—an increase of 23.2% on 2022.

The projects with the largest number of cranes in Sydney include:

- Vicinti and Destination (Macquarie Park, five cranes,)
- Tallawong Village (Tallawong, four cranes,)
- New Sydney Fish Markets (Glebe, four cranes)
- Randwick Campus Redevelopment (Randwick, four cranes)
- Westconnex (Rockdale, four cranes.)
- Western Sydney Airport (Badgerys Creek, four cranes)
- Powerhouse Parramatta (Parramatta, four cranes)

The residential sector saw 102 cranes removed and 95 new cranes erected resulting in a net decrease of seven cranes. This brings the overall number of cranes in the sector to 251. The highest number of residential cranes recorded was 289 in Q3 2017.








RLB CRANE INDEX® - SYDNEY

BASE: Q1 2015 = 100



Within Sydney, the last edition of the RLB Crane Index® highlighted that both the west and east regions recorded their highest number of cranes since Q1 2016, when region allocations commenced. In the past six months the west has seen a 12% reduction (13 cranes), while the east was up by 9% (four cranes) and the north grew by 11 cranes to reach 106. Both the east and north regions recorded their highest number of cranes since Q1 2016.

With 95 cranes, the west currently has nine more cranes than inner Sydney (which has 86 cranes). The only other edition in which the west had more cranes than inner Sydney was in Q3 2018, when the west had one more crane. This continues the trend of cranes shifting from the inner suburbs to the mid and outer suburbs as identified in the Q1 2023 index.

Across Sydney's five main regions, strong gains have been seen in the east and north, while crane numbers reduced in the other three regions. Crane numbers in the north, which previously had the largest proportion of cranes in Sydney, increased by 11 to 106 active cranes. The west had a fall in crane activity with a total of 95 cranes, or 24% of all Sydney cranes.





Sydney's northern suburbs recorded an increase of 11 cranes, bringing the total number of cranes in the north to 106. A total of 50 cranes were added and 39 cranes were removed.

Thirty-six new residential cranes were erected in the past six months together with two commercial, two civic, one civil, three educational, one retail and five mixed use cranes.

A notable new addition is the Vicinti and Destination development (Macquarie Park), which contains five cranes on the site.

Cranes remain concentrated along the primary arterial routes and are prevalent in 48 suburbs. However, cranes were removed from 30 suburbs.





Sydney's west saw a total of 31 new cranes added, and 44 removed; bringing the region's total number of cranes to 95 across 35 suburbs, down from 108 in 41 suburbs in the last edition.

Of the 31 new cranes, 15 were erected for residential construction, 10 for data centres or industrial projects, two were erected for mixed use and one in each of the civic, commercial, education, and retail sectors.










RLB CRANE INDEX® - WOLLONGONG

ABOUT THE RLB CRANE INDEX®

TThe RLB Crane Index® is published by Rider Levett Bucknall biannually in Australia, New Zealand, USA, Canada, Gulf States, Hong Kong, Singapore, Indonesia, Vietnam, Malaysia and Myanmar and South Africa. The Australian index tracks the numbers of cranes in the key cities within Australia.

In September 2012, the Rider Levett Bucknall (RLB) Oceania Research & Development and Communication teams created the RLB Crane Index® 'index' as a simple insight into the construction sector's health within Australia. It was based on the theory that cranes in the sky supported the construction industry, which is a significant contributor to Australia's economic growth.

The RLB Crane Index® gives a simplified measure of the current state of the construction industry's workload in each of these locations.

Each RLB office physically counts all fixed cranes on each city's skyline twice yearly which provides the base information for the index. This information is then applied to a base date (6th edition Q1 2015), which enables the RLB Crane Index® to be calculated highlighting the relative movement of crane data over time for each city.

The indexing of RLB Crane Index® data commenced in Q3 2013, when it was determined that the data collection and reporting methodology was mature and consistent between all offices. Crane counts for that release were indexed to 100 in each city. The index was recalibrated at Q1 2015, which saw the base index value of 100 established for each city. Subsequent cities which are now included within the index have had their base value of 100 established on their initial entry into the count. Subsequent movements in crane numbers are applied to the base RLB Crane Index® to highlight the crane movements in each city over time based on the relative count in Q1 2015.

Using the RLB Crane Index® table data makes for quick comparisons in determining city by city crane activity. For example, when comparing Sydney cranes for the base period of Q1 2015, against the count in Q1 2018, the following formula can be used to determine the percentage increase (or decrease).

where Crane $Index_{cp}$ is the RLB Crane $Index_{cp}$ for the current period and Crane $Index_{pp}$ is the RLB Crane $Index^{®}$ for the previous period.

LOCALITY MAPS

The RLB Crane Index® locality maps offer a pictorial representation of the collected data for each city using a pin locator for the approximate location and sector of the development to where cranes are located.

The pin colour indicates the market sector of the development. The pins are not an indication of the numbers of cranes in that location.

The location of the pins is indicative only and have been positioned to convey the general spread of cranes within a city and to indicate the spread of cranes within market sectors.
